Summary:

Dr. Pantila Bateman and Dr. Richard Kovacs began to promote coordinating care with multiple disciplines for patients admitted with endocarditis due to injection drug use. This order set was developed by multiple providers (infectious disease, addictions, cardiology, CV) nursing, clinical informatics, social services and case management.



What is the purpose of this order set?

Patients admitted with a diagnosis of endocarditis due to injection drug use and severe medical illness. Dr. Pantila Bateman, Cardiologist presented a pathway for this patient population to several Clinical Councils. The pathway was translated into an order set to support care and provide guidance for assessment, immediate consults and care coordination. By providing intervention and support early in hospitalization and post discharge one goal would be to improve long term outcome and prevent readmission.

Pathway






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How is the order set designed?

This order set is considered a mini and NOT a full Admission set of orders. It has targeted orders to be initiated upon admission. The goal is to enter referrals to get multidiscipline staff involved early.

Design is a Multiphase - when the power plan is first initiated:

- 1. Admission phase Initiated first by provider and all orders will be "live"
- **2. Surgical Post op phase** This phase only contains notes for the provider. It will automatically be *planned* and can be referred to later by provider if patient receives surgical intervention.
- 3. **Discharge / Transition to Outpatient phase** This phase will automatically be *planned* and MUST be *initiated* by provider when discharge planning begins. This phase should NOT be started at the last minute and contains Hepatitis vaccinations, pre checked education orders and a naloxone kit that can be ordered.



Who is the targeted audience for this Mini order set?

Admitting physicians, such as Cardiologists, Hospitalists or Critical Care or a cardiologist, ID, addiction specialist and CV consultants may also *initiate* the subphase. The General Admission order set, Cardiac General Admission and Critical Care Admission order set could be used with this mini. We will add a note in these admission order sets to refer to the mini for endocarditis. The mini cannot be embedded because this is built as a multiphase power plan.

Where can the Endocarditis Education documents be found in Cerner?


